# THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

## **Old Testament Reading**

#### Isaiah 9.1-4

<sup>1</sup> Nevertheless, there will be no more gloom for those who were in distress. In the past he humbled the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in the future he will honour Galilee of the nations, by the Way of the Sea, beyond the Jordan – <sup>2</sup> The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned. <sup>3</sup> You have enlarged the nation and increased their joy; they rejoice before you as people rejoice at the harvest, as warriors rejoice when dividing the plunder. <sup>4</sup> For as in the day of Midian's defeat, you have shattered the yoke that burdens them, the bar across their shoulders, the rod of their oppressor.

Hear the word of the Lord, Thanks be to God.

# Psalm 27.1-10

<sup>1</sup> The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom then shall I fear?: the Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?

<sup>2</sup> When the wicked, even my enemies and my foes, come upon me to devour me:

they shall stumble and fall.

<sup>3</sup> If an army encamp against me, my heart shall not be afraid: **and if war should rise against me, yet will I trust.** 

<sup>4</sup> One thing I have asked from the Lord, which I will require: that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, <sup>5</sup> To see the fair beauty of the Lord: and to seek his will in his temple.

<sup>6</sup> For he will hide me under his shelter in the day of trouble: **and conceal me in the shadow of his tent, and set me high upon a rock.** 

<sup>7</sup> And now he will lift up my head: above my enemies round about me. <sup>8</sup> And I will offer sacrifices in his sanctuary with exultation: I will sing, I will sing praises to the Lord.

<sup>9</sup> O Lord, hear my voice when I cry: have mercy upon me and answer me.

<sup>10</sup> My heart has said of you, 'Seek his face': **your face, Lord, I will seek.** 

#### **New Testament Reading:**

#### 1 Corinthians 10.-18

<sup>10</sup> I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you agree with one another in what you say and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be perfectly united in mind and thought. <sup>11</sup> My brothers and sisters, some from Chloe's household have informed me that there are quarrels among you. <sup>12</sup> What I mean is this: one of you says, 'I follow Paul'; another, 'I follow Apollos'; another, 'I follow Cephas'; still another, 'I follow Christ.' <sup>13</sup> Is Christ divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Were you baptised in the name of Paul? <sup>14</sup> I thank God that I did not baptise any of you except Crispus and Gaius, <sup>15</sup> so no one can say that you were baptised in my name. <sup>16</sup> (Yes, I also baptised the household of Stephanas; beyond that, I don't remember if I baptised anyone else.) <sup>17</sup> For Christ did not send me to baptise, but to preach the gospel – not with wisdom and eloquence, lest the cross of Christ be emptied of its power. <sup>18</sup> For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.

Hear the word of the Lord, **Thanks be to God.** 

## <u>Gospel</u>

#### Matthew 4.12-25

<sup>12</sup> When Jesus heard that John had been put in prison, he withdrew to Galilee. <sup>13</sup> Leaving Nazareth, he went and lived in Capernaum, which was by the lake in the area of Zebulun and Naphtali – <sup>14</sup> to fulfil what was said through the prophet Isaiah: <sup>15</sup> 'Land of Zebulun and land of Naphtali, the Way of the Sea, beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles – <sup>16</sup> the people living in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of the shadow of death a light has dawned.' <sup>17</sup> From that time on Jesus began to preach, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near.' <sup>18</sup> As Jesus was walking beside the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon called Peter and his brother Andrew. They were casting a net into the lake, for they were fishermen. <sup>19</sup> 'Come, follow me,' Jesus said, 'and I will send you out to fish for people.' <sup>20</sup> At once they left their nets and followed him. <sup>21</sup> Going on from there, he saw two other brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John. They were in a boat with their father Zebedee, preparing their nets. Jesus called them, <sup>22</sup> and immediately they left the boat and their father and followed him. <sup>23</sup> Jesus went throughout Galilee, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the good news of the kingdom, and healing every disease and illness among the people. <sup>24</sup> News about him spread all over Syria, and people brought to him all who were ill with various diseases, those suffering severe pain, the demon-possessed, those having seizures, and the paralysed; and he healed them. <sup>25</sup> Large crowds from Galilee, the Decapolis, Jerusalem, Judea and the region across the Jordan followed him.

# On This Day: John Dykes Composer of "Holy, Holy, Holy"



"Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty," read Reginald Heber's widow. Among her dead husband's papers, she found the words of one of the most powerful and beautiful hymns ever written. But years would pass before the lines

took their place in worship services around the world.

In 1861, a publisher rediscovered the words. He asked John Bacchus Dykes to furnish him with a tune. John had been a church organist since he was ten-years-old and was co-founder and president of the Cambridge University Musical Society.

John accepted the words. Within thirty minutes he wrote the tune "Nicea," which carried the praise of the **Trinity** to Christians everywhere.

Holy, Holy, Holy Lord God Almighty Early in the morning our song shall rise to Thee; Holy, Holy, Holy, Merciful and Mighty! God in Three Persons, Blessed Trinity!

The year after he composed this famous tune, John was appointed vicar of St. Oswald. This put him in charge of a parish. He was thirty-nine and had already held several lesser church posts. John's people came to love him. His bishop, however, did not care for John's views. John was "high-church." This meant that he stressed the continuity of the Church of England with the Roman **Catholic church** from which it had sprung.

Charles Baring, his bishop, refused to give John any help with his large parish unless he would agree to conduct his services in a more "lowchurch" style. John wouldn't agree and so he had to handle the whole parish himself, a job which exhausted him.

Nonetheless, in addition to his regular duties, he managed to write over 300 hymn tunes. These included some for our favorite hymns, such as "Jesus, the Very Thought of Thee" and less familiar songs such as "Ten Thousand Times Ten Thousand" and "Lead, Kindly Light."

Worn out with his labors and constant friction with his bishop, John died on this day, January 22, 1876. He was just fifty-three years old. Those who loved and admired him, raised £10,000 to support his widow and children. Dan Graves
