THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

Old Testament Reading

Joshua 5.2-12

² At that time the Lord said to Joshua, 'Make flint knives and circumcise the Israelites again.' ³ So Joshua made flint knives and circumcised the Israelites at Gibeath Haaraloth. ⁴ Now this is why he did so: all those who came out of Egypt – all the men of military age – died in the wilderness on the way after leaving Egypt. ⁵ All the people that came out had been circumcised, but all the people born in the wilderness during the journey from Egypt had not. ⁶ The Israelites had moved about in the wilderness for forty years until all the men who were of military age when they left Egypt had died, since they had not obeyed the Lord. For the Lord had sworn to them that they would not see the land that he had solemnly promised their ancestors to give us, a land flowing with milk and honey. ⁷ So he raised up their sons in their place, and these were the ones Joshua circumcised. They were still uncircumcised because they had not been circumcised on the way. ⁸ And after the whole nation had been circumcised, they remained where they were in camp until they were healed. ⁹ Then the Lord said to Joshua, 'Today I have rolled away the reproach of Egypt from you.' So the

place has been called Gilgal to this day. ¹⁰ On the evening of the fourteenth day of the month, while camped at Gilgal on the plains of Jericho, the Israelites celebrated the Passover. ¹¹ The day after the Passover, that very day, they ate some of the produce of the land: unleavened bread and roasted grain. ¹² The manna stopped the day after they ate this food from the land; there was no longer any manna for the Israelites, but that year they ate the produce of Canaan.

Psalm 32

- ¹ Blessed are those whose sin is forgiven: whose iniquity is put away.
- ² Blessed are those to whom the Lord imputes no blame: and in whose spirit there is no guile.
- ³ For whilst I held my tongue: my bones wasted away with my daily complaining.
- ⁴ Your hand was heavy upon me day and night: and my moisture was dried up like a drought in summer.
- ⁵ Then I acknowledged my sin to you: and my iniquity I did not hide;
- ⁶ I said 'I will confess my transgressions to the Lord': and so you forgave the wickedness of my sin.
- ⁷ For this cause shall everyone that is faithful make their prayer to you in the day of trouble: and in the time of the

- great water-flood, it shall not come near them.
- ⁸ You are a place to hide me in, you will preserve me from trouble: you will surround me with deliverance on every side.
- ⁹ 'I will instruct you, and direct you in the way that you should go: I will fasten my eye upon you, and give you counsel.
- 10 'Be not like horse or mule, that have no understanding: whose forward course must be curbed with bit and bridle.'
- ¹¹ Great tribulations remain for the ungodly: but whoever puts their trust in the Lord, mercy embraces them on every side.
- ¹² Rejoice in the Lord, you righteous, and be glad: and shout for joy, all you that are true of heart.

New Testament Reading

2 Corinthians 5.16-21

¹⁶ So from now on we regard no one from a worldly point of view. Though we once regarded Christ in this way, we do so no longer. ¹⁷ Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: the old has gone, the new is here! ¹⁸ All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of

reconciliation: ¹⁹ that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. ²⁰ We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. We implore you on Christ's behalf: be reconciled to God. ²¹ God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

Gospel

Luke 15.11-32

¹¹ Jesus continued: 'There was a man who had two sons. ¹² The younger one said to his father, "Father, give me my share of the estate." So he divided his property between them. 13 'Not long after that, the younger son got together all he had, set off for a distant country and there squandered his wealth in wild living. ¹⁴ After he had spent everything, there was a severe famine in that whole country, and he began to be in need. 15 So he went and hired himself out to a citizen of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed pigs. ¹⁶ He longed to fill his stomach with the pods that the pigs were eating, but no one gave him anything. 17 'When he came to his senses, he said, "How many of my father's hired servants have food to spare, and here I am starving to death! ¹⁸ I will set out and go back to my father and say to him: Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. ¹⁹ I am no longer worthy to be called your son; make me like one of your hired servants." 20 So he got up and went to his father. 'But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion for him; he ran to his son, threw his arms round him and kissed him. ²¹ 'The son said to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son." 22 'But the father said to his servants, "Quick! Bring the best robe and put it on him. Put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. 23 Bring the fattened calf and kill it. Let's have a feast and celebrate. 24 For this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found." So they began to celebrate. 25 'Meanwhile, the elder son was in the field. When he came near the house, he heard music and dancing. ²⁶ So he called one of the servants and asked him what was going on. 27 "Your brother has come," he replied, "and your father has killed the fattened calf because he has him back safe and sound." ²⁸ 'The elder brother became angry and refused to go in. So his father went out and pleaded with him. 29 But he answered his father, "Look! All these years I've been slaving for you and never disobeyed your orders. Yet you never gave me even a young goat so I could celebrate with my

friends. ³⁰ But when this son of yours who has squandered your property with prostitutes comes home, you kill the fattened calf for him!" ³¹ "My son," the father said, "you are always with me, and everything I have is yours. ³² But we had to celebrate and be glad, because this brother of yours was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found.""

ON THIS DAY: Cranmer Got the Top Job but Didn't Want it!



When Thomas Cranmer learned he had been named Archbishop of Canterbury by King Henry VIII, he balked. Visiting Germany at the time to promote the King's interest in a divorce, he dawdled seven weeks getting back to England. Although the King's word was law,

Cranmer hesitated to accept the position. The English church was in a turmoil over the question of Henry's desired divorce from Catherine. Having presented him with no male heir, the queen, once so charming to Henry, was now repugnant. Yet he could not get the Pope to agree to an annulment.

Cranmer had come to the King's attention when he suggested that the universities could just as well settle the question as the Pope. Henry earmarked the priest to become Archbishop of Canterbury, England's highest religious post. Cranmer was consecrated on this date, March 30, 1533.

Believing himself subject to the King, Cranmer promptly granted Henry the annulment. Throughout his tenure as archbishop, he would do pretty much whatever the King commanded. Henry's continual shifts of policy often made Cranmer appear wishy-washy. For example, he ruled Henry's marriage to Anne of Cleve lawful and six months later annulled it as unlawful.

Already leaning toward Protestantism, Cranmer became the chief architect of the English Reformation. He urged the King to place Bibles in England's churches and it was done. He wrote the first *Book of Common Prayer*. In only a few things did he resist Henry. At some jeopardy to himself, he pleaded for the lives of Thomas More and Bishop Fisher and testified for three days against Henry's *Six Articles* which went back to Roman Catholic forms.

By his twisting and turning, Cranmer escaped execution under Henry. Henry trusted him above all his other prelates and on his deathbed clung to Cranmer's hand. Under Edward, Cranmer advanced Protestantism, helping draft doctrines which became the basis for the Church of England's Thirty Nine Articles.

Under pressure, Cranmer supported Lady Jane Gray to succeed Edward. It was not to be. Mary took the throne and charged him with treason and heresy. In face of death he recanted his Protestant opinions. When he learned he was to die anyway, he publicly renounced his recantation. "As for the pope, I refuse him, as Christ's enemy and Antichrist, with all his false doctrine." When the fire was lit, he held the hand that had signed the recantation into the flame, burning it off before the fire touched his body, saying, "This unworthy right hand." As death approached he repeated several times, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit."

Six Types of Friends Evangelism training with Julie-Anne Baird

But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect, keeping a clear conscience, so that those who speak maliciously against your good behaviour in Christ may be ashamed of their slander. 1 Peter 3:15-16

Julie-Anne has identified six types of people in relation to hearing the good news of Jesus Christ and she gives us helpful strategies to enable us to respond as Peter says with gentleness and respect. Friends matter so we must remember to undergird all our interactions with prayer and allow the Holy Spirit's fruit to flow through us.

Here is a summary of the six types of friends and how to respond:

- 1. **Apathetic** these friends have not given much thought to anything let alone things of a spiritual nature. The main way to work with apathetic people is through connection. Connect them with others, God and the hope of Jesus to challenge them to think about things. Especially introduce them to other Christians so that they can see that other people believe other than yourself.
- 2. **Thoughtful** These types of friends are constantly thinking based on a strong worldview. Be curious with them and go deep, asking questions like 'What do you mean by that?', 'Why do you think that?' 'Do you always think that way?' Ask general questions that lead to conversations about values, desires, longings and then aim to connect their answers to God.
- 3. **Interested** these friends show interest in your faith. Share Jesus with them at every opportunity. Have a few bible stories up your sleeve to share e.g. stories about money, stories about Jesus, what He did, what He said.
- 4. **Hostile** these kinds of friends react badly or aggressively to your expressions of faith. Pray for wisdom in knowing how to approach them. Love them, listen, ask questions. Ask God to reveal the source of their

hostility, there is usually a good reason for their big emotional responses. Allow them to have big emotions and ask God to help you learn to sit with it and not get caught up in fear. Sometimes it is wise to do nothing. Take a gentle approach but also hold your ground i.e. agree to disagree. Take the front foot by predicting where things might go in a conversation and prepare in advance, maybe offer a reality check. Know your history, why you have faith and how you came to it to share if the opportunity arises.

- 5. **Religious** those who come from a different faith perspective. Be passionate as a person of faith. These people enjoy discussions about spirituality. Be sure about what you believe if you are going to engage with them.
- 6. **Dechurched** those who used to go to church but no longer do. Stay close with these friends and follow them up. Usually, they have left the church because they have felt hurt by other Christians and still have faith in God. Others have chosen a lifestyle that they realise doesn't sit with Christianity. Remember it is not our role to judge, leave this role to God and believe in faith that He is continuing to work in their lives. Remember pray, love and point to Jesus. If you are good with humour, use it and use the gifts God has given you.
